

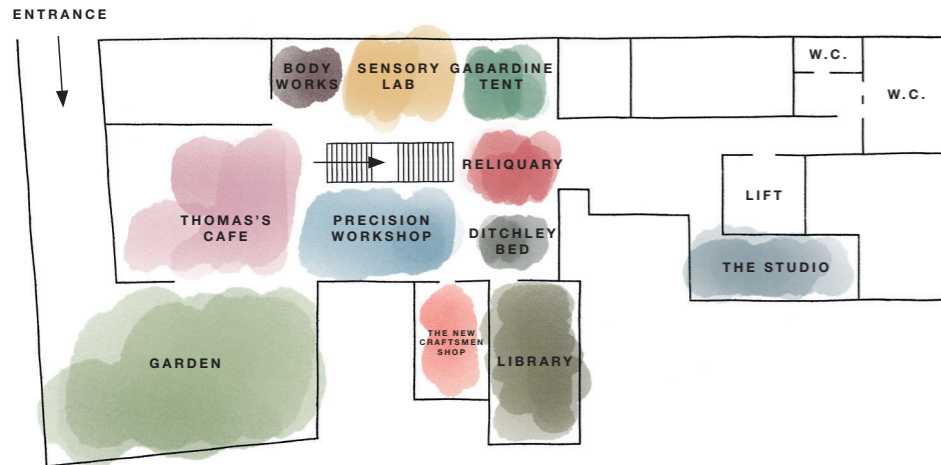
BURBERRY AND THE NEW CRAFTSMEN PRESENT A CELEBRATION OF METHODS, MATERIALS AND MAKERS.

Makers House is open to all. Admission is free of charge.

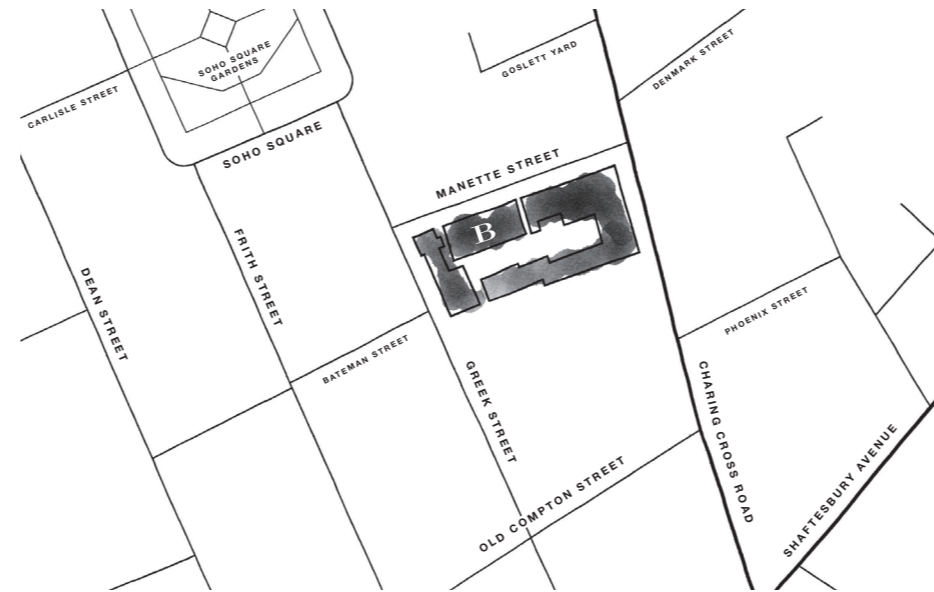

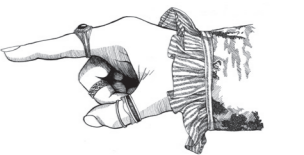

SCULPTING

THOMAS MERRETT

TUESDAY 20 – TUESDAY 27 SEPTEMBER

Working on a single clay sculpture, Thomas will gradually create a figurative artwork depicting the human form. As the week progresses, visitors will experience the emergence of a piece of sculptural art from initial ideas to completion, and can also commission plaster or bronze busts of the finished piece.

Thomas is a scholar of the Queen Elizabeth Scholarship Trust. QEST supports exceptional craftspeople to further their skills and expertise.

SENSORY LAB

SAND CASTING

GRANT MCCAIG

TUESDAY 20 – WEDNESDAY 21 SEPTEMBER

Silversmith Grant will demonstrate a variety of metalworking techniques, including explaining how small keepsakes can be made using the traditional method of sand casting in which liquid metal is poured into a sand mould before it cools and sets.

Grant honed his craft at The Glasgow School of Art and recently completed an MA at the Royal College of Art. His work has been exhibited internationally, from the V&A in London to museums across Russia, China and Japan.

SILK-SCREEN PRINTING

ROSE DE BORMAN

THURSDAY 22 – FRIDAY 23 SEPTEMBER

Rose will be demonstrating the art of silk-screen printing. Silk scarves at varying stages of completeness – and available for purchase – will be on display to show visitors how a finished design is created, layer by layer.

A London-based textile artist, Rose paints and prints unique textiles by hand using a mixture of traditional and modern craft techniques. Her designs are influenced

by the mythology of flora and fauna as well as folk art and traditional textiles.

EXPERIMENTAL DESIGN

MARLÈNE HUISSOUD

SATURDAY 24 – SUNDAY 25 SEPTEMBER

Marlène will be decorating and finishing vessels for purchase made with propolis – a resin produced by bees, the aroma of which evokes the smell of polished country house furniture. Each resin vessel will be finished with intricate hand-engraving techniques to create exquisite surface pattern and texture.

An experimental designer, Marlène graduated from Central Saint Martins with an MA in Textile Futures. Her work questions our way of making by challenging the properties of natural resources.

TRADITIONAL LACQUER

PEDRO DA COSTA FELGUEIRAS

MONDAY 26 – TUESDAY 27 SEPTEMBER

Pedro will be demonstrating a mixture of traditional Japanese lacquer techniques including Junkin-Hiramefun, where solid gold wire is finely sliced to create gold-dot adornments. Some of the finished vessels will be available for purchase.

A specialist in oriental and European lacquer, Pedro develops ancient lacquering processes, bringing them into a modern context. He has worked on many historic country houses and palaces, including Hampton Court.

CALLIGRAPHY

ROSALIND WYATT

TUESDAY 20 – WEDNESDAY 21 SEPTEMBER

Rosalind’s work as an artist, stitcher and calligrapher is about words – the sound of them, the feel of them and the forming of letters. For Makers House she will be selecting words and phrases from the Pin Drop series of readings and showcasing a variety of calligraphic techniques to create mementoes for visitors to the space.

Rosalind has an MA in constructed textiles and mixed media from the Royal College of Art, and a BA in a calligraphy and bookbinding.

FASHION HISTORY

THE BURBERRY ARCHIVISTS

THURSDAY 22 – FRIDAY 23 SEPTEMBER

The Burberry archive team will journey through the pivotal moments from the company’s 160-year history, delving into themes such as its British military heritage, how founder Thomas Burberry came to dress pioneering aviators and polar explorers and the brand’s dedication to great craftsmanship. Supported by rare pieces from the Burberry Heritage Archive, the team will also share secrets behind the innovative gabardine fabric, which remains at the heart of Burberry.

VISIBLE MENDING

TOM OF HOLLAND

SATURDAY 24 – SUNDAY 25 SEPTEMBER

Tom will run a drop-in clinic for visitors to bring along lovedworn garments in need of repair to be stitched, sewn and patched back to their former glory using fabrics from the new Burberry collection.

A self-taught textiles practitioner, Tom works primarily with wool. He favours the old and imperfect over the brand new, as it brings to light the relationship between garment and wearer that has developed over time, creating a piece of clothing that is as unique as the history that created it.

MINIATURE PORTRAITS

HOLLY FREAN

MONDAY 26 – TUESDAY 27 SEPTEMBER

Holly will be setting up her studio in the tent at Makers House, where visitors will be able to book one-hour slots in advance to have their portrait painted in miniature, in Holly’s inimitable style – and inspired by the old master paintings found in grand country houses.

A visual artist, her work is based around picture making in all its forms, from oil painting to gouache, printmaking and three-dimensional work.

PRECISION WORKSHOP

PASSEMENTERIE

AIMEE BETTS AND JESSICA LIGHT

TUESDAY 20 SEPTEMBER

Passementerie is the process of making elaborate trimmings or tassels. Aimee and Jessica will work alongside other embroidery experts on creating exquisitely precise and decorative embellishments for the Ditchley bed in Makers House.

Aimee is a mixed-media embroidery designer and creator of adornments combining traditional embroidery techniques with cutting-edge technology. Jessica crafts handmade passementerie using methods that date back to the 15th and 16th centuries.

BOOKBINDING

SHEPHERDS AND BESPOKE & BOUND

WEDNESDAY 21 – THURSDAY 22 SEPTEMBER

Discover the art of bookbinding: each and every step of the process will be undertaken at Makers House, from stitching and binding to spine finishing, inlaying and debossing.

Bespoke & Bound combines time-honoured, artisan leather-working and bookbinding with contemporary design techniques to handcraft made-to-order photo albums and notebooks in London. Shepherds creates luxury stationery using traditional hand bookbinding techniques applied with an eye for modern design.

STITCHING AND EMBROIDERY

ROYAL SCHOOL OF NEEDLEWORK

FRIDAY 23 – SUNDAY 25 SEPTEMBER

Be entranced by the intricate work of the Royal School of Needlework. Focusing on Elizabethan

styles of embroidery and in particular ‘blackwork’, they will create pillowcases and cushion covers for the Ditchley bed.

EMBELLISHMENT

KING’S TROOP

MONDAY 26 – TUESDAY 27 SEPTEMBER

Three saddlers – including the King’s Troop master saddler and harness maker Godfrey Morris – will showcase a selection of military tack and uniform displays, as well as the tradition and intricacies of their craft.

Alongside demonstrations of the saddler’s cutting techniques, repairs and leather preparation for stitching, exclusive key rings made by the King’s Troop will be available to personalise and purchase.

DITCHLEY BED

PATCHWORKING

RACHEL SCOTT

TUESDAY 20 – MONDAY 26 SEPTEMBER (10AM – 1PM)

Stationed by the Ditchley bed at Makers House, Rachel will be creating a unique, one-off patchwork cushion cover using materials from the new runway collection.

A Royal College of Art alumnus, Rachel now focuses her work on making rugs from natural wools, exhibiting a consideration for organic fabric and form contrasted with a strong geometric aesthetic. Her patchwork skills have been honed through a strong desire to repurpose precious fabrics gathered over many years.

JAMESPLUMB

JAMESPLUMB was founded by two artists, Hannah Plumb and James Russell, in London, in 2009.

JAMESPLUMB’s aesthetic is not easily pinned down. There is a love of unorthodox and unconventional beauty. Their objects and environments are enriched with the complex patina of time and life. Their installation ‘Reading Steps’ is a found structure, re-imagined. No longer a means to go somewhere, it has become the somewhere. A place where visitors can reflect quietly and contemplate.

PIN DROP

TUESDAY 20 – TUESDAY 27 SEPTEMBER (1 – 1:15PM)

Makers House becomes a stage: a series of short readings will be performed daily by actors and actresses curated by Burberry, Pin Drop and BAFTA Breakthrough Brits, with the majority of readings focussing on Virginia Woolf’s novel Orlando – one of the central themes behind the new runway collection.
